[1] The purpose of this course is to provide students with an opportunity to critically explore the theoretical perspectives of illiberalism, exploring its regional variations.

The students will be able to demonstrate an understanding of the nature of illiberalism, and examine and discuss its various manifestations.

- [2] The content of the course encompasses the following: 1. Introduction to the class, questions and answers session 2. Illiberalism as an ideology. 3. Illiberalism as trend and tendency and social phenomenon. 4. Asia's Illiberal Governments. 5. Cultural Sources and Institutional Practice of Authoritarianism in China. 6. The Intertwining of Liberalism and Illiberalism in India. 7. Indonesia's "Third- wave" Democratic Model? 8. Latin America Breathing: Liberalism and Illiberalism, Once and Again. 9. From Antiestablishmentarianism to Bolsonarism in Brazil. 10. The Balkans. 11. Illiberalism in Central and Eastern Europe. 12. The Illiberal Challenge in the European Union. 13. Turkey as a Model of Muslim Authoritarianism? 14. Consultation. 15. Submission of papers.
- [3] The mode of delivery includes 2 hours, long classes, in a week, based on individual reading and student presentation. The process covers discovery learning, problem-based learning, group-based learning (if possible), and independent studies.
- [4] Assessment criteria are as follows: demonstrated comprehension of the reading material; ability to argue; clarity of expression; an orderly flow of thoughts and proper use of formal English.

Exam: paper submission: 60%. It consists of i) Presentation in class (slides; 20%), and submission of the finalized paper based on the discussion (approx. 2000 words 40%). Papers should be sent to drinoczi.timea@gmail.com or dopped of in the common folder (to be discussed) by 09/6/2023.
